A group of us went from Digswell Village Church, and I saw a large contingent from Oxlease there as well.

The sermon was delivered by Revd. Helen Kirk, chair of the Chester and Stoke-on-Trent district, and she amusingly and thoughtfully compared us as Christians with her own newborn granddaughter – beloved before she had achieved or done anything, as we are beloved by God despite our failings. It was also pointed out to the ordinands that although the day was the culmination of a lot of work and effort, it is only the beginning of their journey as ministers.

Rosemary and the other candidates were presented to the President of Conference, and after the acclamation from the congregation of "They are worthy", they knelt while the President and each ordinand's assisting minister laid hands upon their heads. Rosemary was assisted by our own circuit superintendent Revd David Jebb. A bible was presented to each ordinand.

After the service there was joyous and impromptu singing and dancing in the entrance from Rosemary and the Zimbabwean fellowship. Tea and biscuits rounded off a wonderful afternoon

We heard about the difference small projects are making to the communities in which they are based, and the bigger challenges that we are facing nationally and globally. Abridged report from the June circuit meeting

NOTES FROM CIRCUIT MEETING HELD 18/06/2024 AT OXLEASE METHODIST CHURCH

It was a depleted meeting with only 20 people in attendance. We firstly heard news from all of the churches of the good things that are happening. Here is a list of what I noted.

MRMC – Club Saturday is now running, I think once a month, under the guidance of Maggie Dodd and Nigel Perrott; they are starting All Age Worship once a month.

HRMC – Following a successful Youth Alpha course, four of the participants were confirmed; there has been a Youth Service; Afternoon tea taking place 29th June; chance to chat on a Monday morning at Morrisons.

SJPB – Autumn alpha course has 12 people signed up none of whom come to church currently; creative church has expanded and has moved into the main hall; weekly welcome space continues with many non church people attending for friendship, food, games; helping with Churches Together Holiday Club in summer; discussions ongoing on whether to employ an outreach worker; considering having a gang show in November.

Radlett – A Churches Together Advent Course is going to be run from the church; 2 new members; churches together picnic in July; Anglicans running a God and chips event.

Shenley – Messy church continues to go well; new baby and toddlers group bringing 22 children plus parents/carers; looking at running a couple of summer camps in August.

DVC – 60th anniversary year with a big event on 7th July with a live band and a march around the village; prayers for the street; holiday club in August.

LW – Mother and Toddler group has restarted; work being carried out to accommodate renewal of long term letting.

Oxlease – Had run the Pentecost BBQ; having a cultural day on 21st July with service and fellowship with food; working with the scouts to have a service together; start of a monthly Café Church service.

Panshanger – Praying round the streets; Hope café; ongoing work in the church to accommodate increasing attendance on Sunday mornings.

Cornerstone – Now an official centre being used by Social Services; 2 trips planned over the summer plus Farm visiting Cornerstone; after school club continues to grow with 12 children coming.

The churches were congratulated for their ongoing work and mission and the CLT reminds the churches that it is an enabling body and with circuit finances in a healthy state, can contribute to the work, but the local churches are in charge of their own mission.

The circuit accounts have now been signed off and will be lodged with the relevant body including list of trustees. The figures for the current financial year are projected to show a small surplus. We have benefitted from increase interests receipts, but have had to spend some of that on unexpected manse repairs. We have moved in the right direction since 21/22 when the circuit made a £28k loss. Our reserves stand at £145k which is just under 50% of annual expenditure and more or less in line with our policy. The budget for next financial year was agreed at previous meeting and is projected at break even again. A £2,000 grant to Ludwick way was approved which is to make alterations to accommodate an existing letting. A short term loan to Radlett had been made since last meeting and it is hoped this will be repaid in the not too distant future. This was requested to upgrade the previous

manse after a long term letting to prepare the property for a new let. It was noted that money could be released to do mission work by selling properties within the circuit although this then does mean that rental income would then be lost.

It was confirmed that the Connexion has approved the closure of Birchwood, and a management committee has been set up to look after the premises as it will continue to be rented to the special needs school and for use for other mission purposes. A thanksgiving service is taking place at Birchwood church on the 4th August at 3pm.

The LPWL committee was pleased to announce that Claire Debnam has moved to on trial following successful period on note with Stuart Johnson. Also Maggie Dodd is looking to go through local preacher training. Sadly, Gladys Smith's health prevents her from carrying out any preaching for the time being. It was highlighted that there will be a Study Day at St John's on 26th October – details will be published elsewhere, and there will be a Quiet Day next year during lent.

We were told that Safeguarding and EDI needs to be on all church council agendas going forwards. Whilst we have carried out a lot of training over the last year and many people have done the requisite training, there are a number of people in roles where training MUST be carried out. Anyone who has not done the training by this August, will have to be asked to step down from their respective roles until training has been completed. We are being audited as a circuit so it is important that you make sure your church is up to date in this area.

We are looking at getting the Circuit accredited as an Eco Circuit as we have three churches that have accreditation, but it would be good for all of us to consider this aspect within our churches.

ECO CHURCH

We know that many of our churches are working to become recognised as Eco Churches by A Rocha, the Christian charity working to protect and restore the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment. Each month, they issue an Eco Tip, to help us all to do our bit, and here are the tips for July & August:



JULY

Taste the benefits of seasonal and local food. Plan to incorporate locally grown produce into your diet and shopping list throughout the seasons, as it is harvested at its peak ripeness, ensuring superior flavour compared to imported alternatives that have travelled thousands of miles. If saying grace before a meal is regular practice in your household, this month, include giving thanks for your local food producers.

AUGUST

Assist local wildlife during very hot weather. Provide hedgehogs with hedgehog biscuits (available at many pet stores and online) or dog biscuits (small/ crumbed) as their prey of slugs, snails and worms diminishes, and ensure a safe exit for them and other small mammals if you have a garden pond. Help garden birds by maintaining a filled bird bath and supplying supplementary food including black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins, currants, mealworms, waxworms, and a nutritious seed mixture, when natural supplies become scarce.

Notes from the Eco Forum held on Monday 24th June 2024

The meeting was well attended with 16 individuals representing more than 12 churches and 6 circuits. Angela Brydon opened with prayer and indicated that the meeting would be kept short given the warm evening.

As there were a number of folk present at the forum for the first time we went around the room introducing ourselves and sharing our Eco Stories. It was apparent from the time of sharing that things are progressing whether toward awards or by deepening the work already done.

Some folks had received an email from A Rocha indicating that a new survey would be available shortly. As not everyone had received the email, Angela agreed to forward that to everyone. Basically, anyone using the old survey has until the end of the year to complete awards. So, if just starting then the new survey should be used when available. Angela to email Hamish Leese to see if has any knowledge of the new survey.

As a District we currently have 51% of churches across the District registered for Eco Church with 47% of those churches with Bronze awards and 10% with Silver. This is good progress towards the Methodist Church targets for 2026 of 50% of churches registered and 50% of registered church to have Bronze awards and 20% with Silver.

Questions were asked about a District Mission plan, and Angela reported that this is a work in progress, but there is a working document available that is helpful, before it is agreed. Please email Angela if you would like a copy.

There was a discussion about which of our Circuits were registered with Eco Church. Currently North Beds (Bronze), Colchester, Chelmsford and St Albans & Welwyn are registered with South Beds planning to register. All Circuits have at least 2 churches registered for Eco Church so further steady progress here. It was acknowledged that A Rocha don't really understand circuits and the way we manage manses in the Methodist Church. Angela to contact Hamish to see if he was aware of any progress.

Blister packs were once again discussed and there is a mixed response from Superdrug, however Boots are starting to roll out a collection scheme. Also, a refill shop in Chelmsford is in contact with Astra Zeneca about recycling <u>blister packs</u>. We hope to have details to pass on so that others can perhaps petition Astra Zeneca too.

The meeting closed in prayer at 8.30pm
